Owner: Benjamin Frye and John Tyler Co. Ledger of Richmond, Virginia

Type of ledger: records inventory sold to specific individuals and the prices of the items sold.

Dates: 1848-1849

Details: Scottsville is written in ink across the back cover of the ledger. The ledger lists John Tyler's name on the front inner page of ledger along with Benjamin Frye's name. This may indicate a business relationship between the two men, one as supplier and one as merchant. A U.S. Federal Census record from the 20 of November 1850 indicates that John Tyler lived in Scottsville and worked as a merchant circa 1850, on the same street as the Masons and the Beals (6). Benjamin Frye, as a farmer, may have supplied items such as bags of apples and kegs of butter to John Tyler as merchant.

Items listed as sold within ledger:

Food items such as kegs of butter, sacks of salt, bags of apples, sugar, coffee, brandy, flour.

Work items such as shovels and barrels of oil.

The ledger also records how the goods were transported, either by "own wagon" or by "own team", by "The Delaware", by "boat", or by "John Tyler".

Historic Information:

The town of Scottsville reached its peak population circa 1841 and 1842 with a total of 1000 (Ref: Goldstone, p. 40). Due to its location along the major trading route of the Staunton and James River Turnpike, the town became a hub between Richmond and cities to the west (Ref: Goldstone, p. 41). Additionally, Scottsville connected to Richmond via nine freight boats, such as the Messers, Shepperson, & Co. and two passenger boats (Ref. 2). The level of trade and business in Scottsville reached its height in the 1840s and began to decline due to the advent of the railway and abandonment of canal usage. Prior to this decline, the town of Scottsville is described as consisting of "twenty-four mechanics' shops of various kinds, three taverns, one tobacco factory, and four churches" (Ref: Goldstone, p. 40).

For more information about Benjamin F. Frye, the Virginia, Deaths and Burials Index records the following information: Benjamin Frye was born around 1801 in Shenandoah, Virginia, and died in March of 1867 in Frederick, Virginia, at the age of 66. His listed race is white and occupation is farmer. It is recorded that he was married to a woman named Hannah Frye (Ref. 4).

The record of transportation methods within the ledger includes canal boats, such as "The Delaware." The advent of the James River and Kanawha canal as means of water transportation and turnpikes allowed for a larger scope of trade in Virginia in the 1840s.
