



Baby Pigs Try Synthetic Milk-How do baby pigs fare on synthetic milk?

That's the question often asked by farmers, and the answer is upcoming at VPI's animal husbandry department.

There, staff members put five pigs of a litter of nine on one of the sythetic formulas about five weeks ago. To date the pigs look uniform and weigh 20 pounds each as compared to 18 pounds each for the pigs remaining with the sow. So far, the pigs on the synthetic ration have consumed 22 pounds of milk each, at a cost of 25c per pound.



his fishing rod. He went outside and there was Boscum-digging like crazy for worms!




