As to Mr. Stanley and Mr. Fenwick both are very fine gentlemen. In so far as their public statements are concerned they are in exactly the same relative positions on public affairs except in one instance. Mr. Stanley says, in effect, he endorses the present set up as "Sound and Conservative government" and stops right there with that blanket coverage. Mr. Fenwick says exactly the same except that he adds a little by saying that he favors adding a couple of more bureaus.

Thus, as between Stanley and Fenwick they both proclaim their support for the existing situation of massive over-fat state bureaucracy directing and harassing the people. Unless the situation changes the choice between them would be difficult except, perhaps, on a personality basis.




