James F. Dorrier, manager of the Scottsville branch of the National Bank and Trust Company of Charlottésville, will retire from his position on January 1 of this week, and will be replaced by W. A. McClanahan, former supervisor of other branches of the same bank in Albemarle and Fluvanna Counties.

Mr. Dorrier is terminating, because of his health and the bank retirement plan, a long term of service with the bank in Scottsville. He started his banking career when the Scottsville National Bank, an independent organization, was started in 1901, serving as cashier in that organization.
