



Eggs Price Outlook

A favorable egg price situation for poultrymen likely will continue throughout the rest of the year, but a slump is in sight for Febru-

Dr. Robert J. Krueger, associate agricultural economist at VPI, says eggs normally average about 8 percent higher in November than in September. This year, however, there is not likely to be a full 8 percent increase.

The supply of chicks for laying purposes will be up next year. Taking into account the normal seasonal tendencies, there will probably not be a noticeable increase in the supply of eggs before February. However, from February on through the rest of 1954, poultrymen will be faced with lower egg prices.

Lice Control Needed On Cattle Lice often are the cause of declines in milk and beef production so treat cattle for lice before putting them in winter quarters.

Dr. J. O. Rowell says the lice should be destroyed any time they are found on animals, but it is especially important to control them at this time of year, since they reproduce and spread rapidly among cattle in warm, congested quarters.

A single thorough treatment with 11/2 percent DDT spray will eliminate lice completely, but should not be used on cattle in the milking herd, or those being finished for slaughter.

One application of a lindane spray can be used on dairy animals and beef animals alike. Apply lindane at the rate of 11/2 pounds of a 25 percent gamma wettable powder to 100 gallons of water. Lindane will control both lice and mange mites. Dr. Rowell warns, however, not to use lindane sprays on calves under three months old.

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




