Farm Notes County

By P. H. France At least one cause of the mysterious disease of cattle has been found.

The Sinclair Refining Company, Sinclair Research Laboratories, Inc., and the VPI Agricultural Experiment Station have announced jointly that a highly chlorinated napthalene will produce a bovine hyperkeratosis, or X disease. The discovery follows a year of intensive work by Dr. Wilson B. Belt veterinarian at VPI.

The malady appeared in this country about 10 years ago and scientists have been looking for the cause or causes ever since. Although not too widespread, X disease has caused considerable concern to livestock producers. Affected animals lost their appetite, their eyes water, they slobber constantly, their skin becomes rough and hard, and the animals nearly always die.

Materials that have been used to produce the disease experimentally include a certain kind of proressed alfalfa, feed concentrate, a wood preservative, and a lubricant. It is possible, says Dr. Bell, that a highly chlorinated napthalene in some way has gained entrance into the feed materials or is present in the wood preservative. It is also possible, he believes, that other chemicals may be found that will cause the disease.

A complete report of Dr. Bell's work is being published in the July issue of the Virginia Journal of Science.

Start spraying tomatoes to control late blight-particularly if cool, damp weather continues. The disease may appear at any time.

Insoluble copper is the recommended control material. It is available from most farm supply stores. Directions for mixing usually are found on the container. Another chemical, zineb, also is

The new price control law is better than its predecessorfor the reason that it modifies and eliminates some of the powers of the controllers. But it is still a bad law-for the reason that anything which permits political dictation of the economy, and political tinkering with the natural law of supply and demand, is bad.

Shortly before the new law was passed, the House did the right thing by voting for a measure which would have party to keep it going through the lifted virtually all controls on consumer goods. However, strong pressures were brought to bear and the compromise bill was accepted.

Should it turn out that Ike is as "liberal" in his thinking as are the principals of the movement that caused his nomination then we are faced with the situation of both major parties pushing leftward and with no instrumentality existing through and by which the conservative voice may be heard. Certain it is that conservative Republicans now look upon their party with much concern. That hey should pump their individual strength and substance into the years and then lose the party to the liberals is not a pleasing outlook.

These were a different subspices, however than ones we have. Our winter visitors are the Boreal Slate-colored Juncos-the ones we found in the mountains being the Carolina Junco. These seemed larger, more gray, and had a pale gray rather than the flesh-colored bill of our winter friends. There were many Towhees. The Blue-headed Vireo we heard several times, quite distinguishable from the Red-eyed, which nests with us. We caught a fleeting glimpse of a Chestnutsided Warbler feeding young, saw



a female Black-throated Blue Warbler, a Black and White Warbler and heard Field Sparrows and Cardinals. We saw no hawks, nor did a Raven, which we hoped we might see, come into the picture.
