Three three-year-olds celebrated a triple birthday in as quiet a manner as can be expected of three-year-olds and a few friends at the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Callahan, on Saturday, September 13.

This is the third time they have had the triple celebration, and it won't be the last, because — you guessed it — they are triplets. At first glance, they look more like twin girls and a boy, but the doctor who delivered them said it wasn't that way. There was so much excitement at the little hospital at Warrenton when they were born, nobody is quite sure just how it was, except that Agnes came first. The other two are Jimmy and Ann. Jimmy is blond and brown-eyed, and his sisters who complete the triple-threat to ever having a dull moment around the Callahan home are red-heads with blue-green eyes.

Mrs. Callahan, who has two daughters, Mary, a sixth-grader and Dolores, in the third grade, wanted a boy the last time, but

she says "it took two girls to get one." But she is happy with her family that increased by three all at once like an economy-sized package. Mary helps with the children and learned to cook this summer. And when the triplets were born, Gerbers offered free baby food for two years, and Pet Milk kept them supplied during the first year. Publicity and gifts were showered upon the attractive babies, but since coming to Scottsville two years ago, they have lived a normal life and don't leave home very much. "Too much to handle," says their sensible mother. She says they have always been in the best of health, never having suffered anything more than the usual colds now and then. Mrs. Callahan is the former Miss Margaret Gibson of Baltimore, where she married Mr. Callahan. They came to Virginia from Maryland shortly before the triplets were born and like it so well, they expect to stay here. Mr. Callahan is in charge of the Jersey herd at Fair View Farm, where they make their home.

Fluvanna HD Clubs Set Up '53 Program

Representatives of Fluvanna County Home Demonstration Clubs met Thursday in the Home Agent's office to set up their 1953 Program Calendar.

Mrs. W. N. Hannah, county chairman, presided.

The program planning committee is made up of the county committee officers, club presidents, presidents elect and program development chairmen.

The following county program was set up after suggestions were presented by each club program development chairman, followed by a discussion led by Miss Lucy Blake, District Home Demonstration Agent from V.P.I.: Table Service for Every Occasion; Loaf Breads and Brown & Serve Rolls; Study of Fabrics and Their Care; Points in Buying the Better Dress; Textile Painting; Milk Dishes including Cottage Cheese; Table Linens; Repair of Simple Electrical Equipment; Household Mechanics, and Uses of Apples.

The library goal was selected as Federation Goal for 1953, and each month some phase of the library program will be presented at the club meetings, such as, book review on Christmas books, cook-books, books by Virginia writers, histories of Virginia, art books, birds, flower arrangement, current fiction, a biography, poetry for children, and books for gifts.

The following club objectives were recommended by the committee: To continue the study of Civil

Defense, and Bangs Disease Control, put more emphasis on 4-H work, and encourage club women to read five or more books from the Recommended Good Reading List.

Special Interest Activities for the year included a Tailoring Workshop and Gardening.

Attorneys Seek Fee In Advance; Turn Down Case

Because the attorneys for the defendant refused to represent him without payment of a fee in advance, the trial of Walter Woodson 32-year-old Negro of Richmond, was continued in Fluvanna circuit court Monday until counsel is obtained by him.

With the courtroom packed and a complete jury panel of 20 on hand, Percy and J. Robert Smith, Richmond attorneys, told Judge Edward Meeks that they were not prepared to defend Woodson, who is charged with assaulting and attempting to rape a 46-year-old Columbia woman last August.

Judge Meeks made it known that he did not like the idea of the postponement. He said that it was not proper, and "possibly unethical" for attorneys who had previously accepted a case to refuse to serve as counsel for the defense after they had been summoned to court.

Fluvanna County Commonwealth Attorney, Ralph P. Zehler, who had engaged Edwin Wingfield, Charlottesville attorney, to assist him in the case, told the court that he had spent two weeks in preparation for the trial, and that it was a serious matter to throw out such intensive work because attorneys for the defense had not been able to collect any fees in advance. A new trial will be set when Woodson, who is being held in Fluvanna County jail, finds another attorney. He was accompanied to court by his mother.

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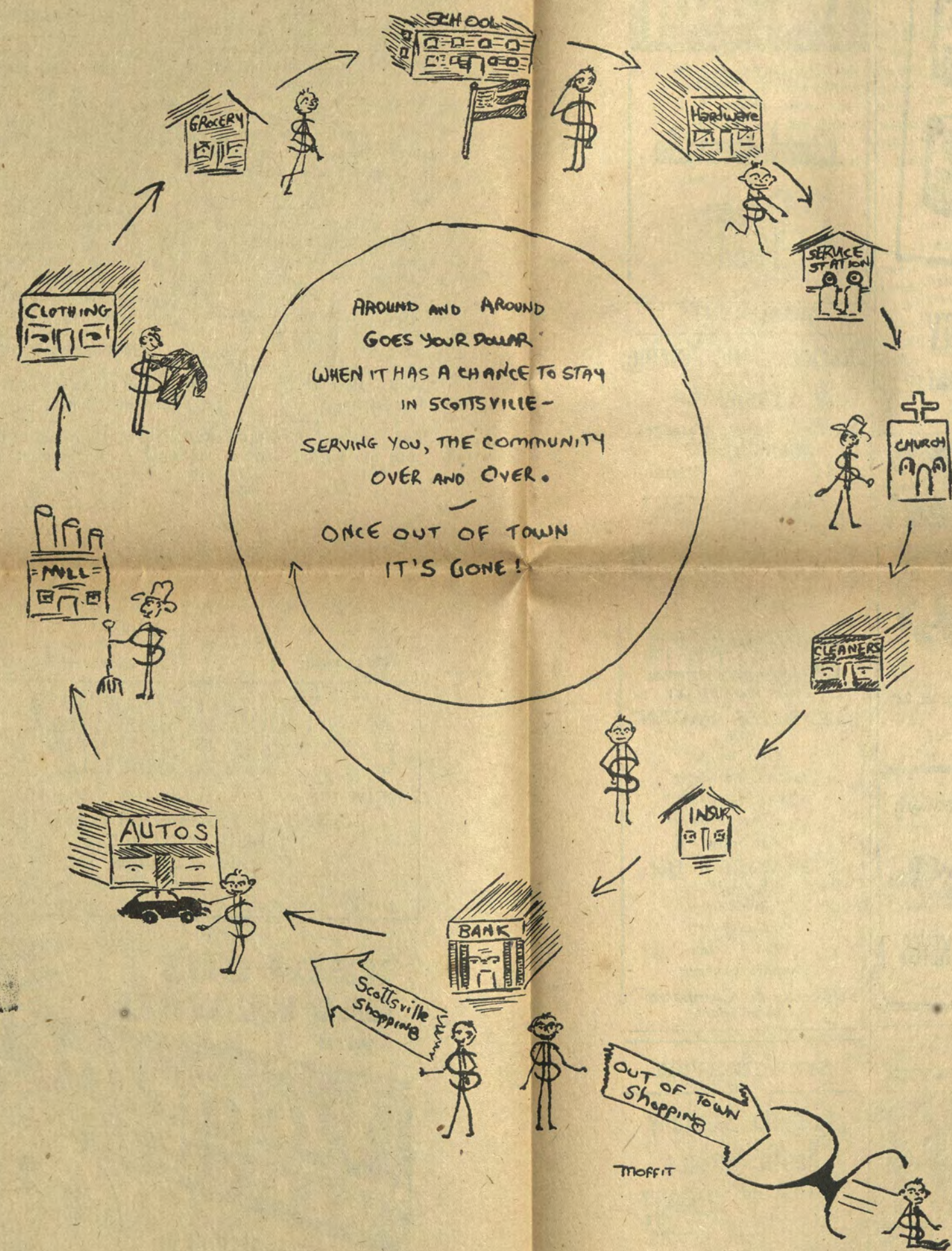
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Household Hints

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Many of the homemakers now own blenders so I would like to enter a few menus for their future home use.

Freezing blended fruits is helpful and yields flavorful fruit that still contains both the skin and pulp. The only straining needed is when it is necessary to remove the seed.

BLUEBERRY

1 lb. Blueberries, about 3 cups
1-4 cup water
1-3 cup sugar

Place blueberries and water in saucepan and bring to a boil. Place in glass container of blender. Cover blender and turn on letting it blend until smooth—about one minute. Add sugar and stir until dissolved. Cool slightly and pack in suitable containers. Makes about 2 1-2 cups.

TOMATO

2 lbs tomatoes
1 1-4 teaspoons salt
Wash tomatoes. Remove stem and any bad spots. Cut into quarters or sixths. Place in saucepans and bring to a boil. Cook 3 minutes. Drain lightly. Place drained tomatoes in glass container of blender. Cover container and turn blender on. Let run until smoothly blended—about 10 seconds. Strain. Add salt. Cool slightly and pack into suitable containers. Makes 2 2-3 cups thick and 1-2 cup thin juice.

New and fascinating beverages can also be prepared in the blender—saving time and yielding a new flavor.

FROSTED SODA

12 oz. bottle root beer, cream soda or cola beverage, chilled.
1-3 cup vanilla ice cream
Place all ingredients in the glass container. Cover and turn blender on. Run until smooth and fluffy. serve immediately. Each recipe makes from two to four servings.

PINEAPPLE BUTTERMILK
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1-2 cup light corn syrup
1-2 cup crushed pineapple
1 1-2 cups buttermilk
Follow the same procedure as frosted sodas.

HONEY GRAHAM MILK SHAKE
2 graham crackers crumbled
1 heaping tablespoon chocolate ice cream
1 cup milk

ORANGE NOG
1 1-4 cups cold milk
1 egg
1-3 cup concentrated quick frozen orange juice

1-2 cup vanilla ice cream
Dash nutmeg
Cooky batter is also easily made in the blender.

ORANGE BRAN BARS

2-3 cup sifted flour
1-8 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon baking powder
2-3 cup ready-to-eat bran
1 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
2 tablespoons butter
2-3 cup orange marmalade
2-3 cup sugar
1-2 cup seedless raisins

Sift flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon into mixing bowl. Add bran. Place remaining ingredients in glass container of blender. Cover container and turn blender on. Run until raisins are finely cut, about 30 seconds. Pour blended mixture over flour mixture. Stir lightly to mix well. Pour into greased 9 x 11 inch square pan. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F, until firm, about 25 minutes. Cut in finger length bars while still warm. Roll in confectioners' sugar if desired. Makes 48 bars.

FRUITY CUSTARDS

Just place all ingredients except egg in the glass container of blender. Cover and blend until smooth, about 1 minute. Remove cover and add egg. Blend just 3 seconds. Pour into 3 greased custard cups

and place in pan of hot water. Bake in slow oven, 325 degrees F., until set, about 40 minutes. Or place on a rack in a saucepan and add enough water to come about 1 inch above rack. Cover and cook 15 to 20 minutes over low heat, making sure water boils constantly. Makes three servings.

3-4 cup hot milk
1 tablespoon Karo or honey
1-3 cup diced unpeeled apple
1 egg

COTTAGE CHEESE
3-4 cup hot milk
1 tablespoon Karo or honey
1-3 cup cottage cheese
1 egg
Dash nutmeg

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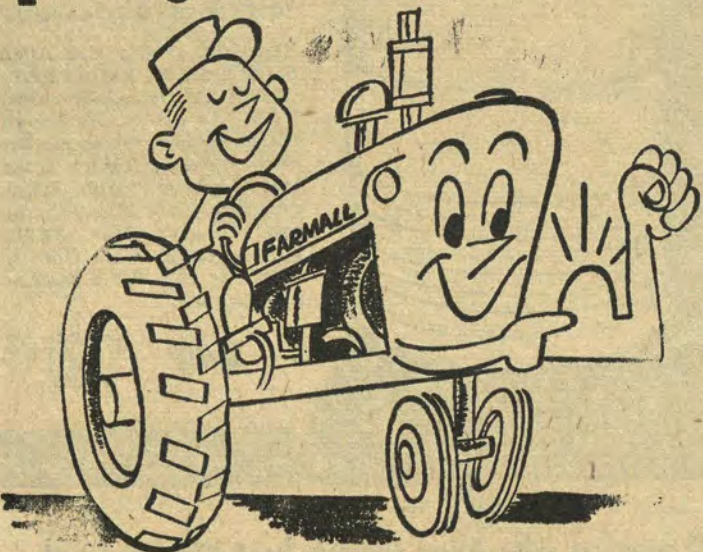
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
