#### Rifle Shot Takes Life Of Young Scottsville Soldier

Walter Douglas Allen, Jr. 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter D. Allen. Sr., of Scottsville was found shot to death Tuesday, December 1, in the guard room under the amphitheatre adjacent to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington.

Corporal Allen, who enlisted in the army on February 4, 1952, had been serving as sentry at the tomb.

He was found by two sergeants when they came to the guard room to post the guard. Another sentry, always on duty at the tomb. heard no shot, and there is no clue as to who had been with him.




