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## The Scottsville Story

Chapter IV

The church plays an important role in any community. Scottsville can boast of the fact that it possesses several active churches to which a place in the Scottsville Story should rightly be devoted.

The Methodists of Scottsville first proposed to build their church on the opposite side of the street from where the present Scottsville Methodist Church now stands. At the time when the present building was erected, in 1833, the church belonged to the Albemarle Circuit. Some time later the Albemarle Circuit was divided and the circuit which still held the Scottsville church was known as the Scottsville circuit.

During the Civil War, services were seldom held due to the fact that many of them left for the war.

In the period between 1902-1906, the church underwent extensive repairs. In 1927-1928 the building was remodeled and a wing added containing fourteen Sunday School rooms, a new front entrance and a bell tower.

A unique memorial gift is the set of Schulmerich chimes which reproduce carrillon music from a loudspeaker at the top of the bell tower. This set of chimes was given by Mr. and Mrs. Sam Butler in honor of their first son, Forrest, who gave his life in World War II.

The Scottsville Baptist Church was founded in 1840 largely due to the efforts of Edward Moon, a farmer in the community. Shortly thereafter, the brick church which is located on Harrison Street and which starts on a knoll overlooking the town, was built. In the church yard is a little cemetery, unique in that it is the only cemetery located in the town of Scottsville.

The pulpit furniture which is now in the Baptist church came from the home of Miss Lottie Moon. Miss Lottie and her sister, Edmonia, were Baptist missionaries to China. They were the daughters of Edward Moon.

During the Civil War years, the church did not have a pastor, but it is likely that religious services were held there at times. The church's greatest contribution at this period was its services as a hospital for the sick and wounded.

The main part of the building is the original church house which was remodeled in 1930. Remodeling included the enlargement of the auditorium, addition of eight Sunday School rooms and a baptistry. Recently a modern heating plant has been installed.

The original Scottsville Presbyterian church was organized at Warren in 1827. In October, 1827, this church was taken over by the West Hanover Presbytery. In 1830 the name was changed from Warren Presbyterian Church to Scottsville Presbyterian Church. When the church was organized it had only six members.

Scottsville Presbyterians first worshipped in the Concord House, which formerly stood on the soil where the Presbyterian Cemetery Crawford, Nancy Walton, Frankie McGuinn, Mitchie Dillard, Billy Hamm, John Bell, Buford Wood.

### Scottsville Voters Give Stanley 122-19 Majority

Voting was extremely light at the Scottsville precinct, as is was all over the State, in the Virginia Democratic Primary, held here Tuesday. Only 145 voters cast ballots out of approximately 300 eligible voters.

Light balloting was accredited to the fact that very little campaigning was carried on in this immediate area and, therefore, public interest was not aroused.

Thomas B. Stanley received 122 votes and Charles R. Fenwick received 19 votes in the race for the gubernatorial nomination.

### School Improvement Plans Postponed

Action on proposed improvements to the primary school at Scottsville High School, approved last week by the Albemarle County School Board, was postponed by the Board of Supervisors at their regular meeting in Charlottesville yesterday.

Plans for the installation of a central heating system and the addition of a classroom were presented to the supervisors by school board members F. E. Paulett and J. Henley. An appropriation of approximately \$2200 for the heating plant and \$15,000 for its installation and the construction of a brick addition to the primary school would have to be made by the board of supervisors before the improvements could be made.

Charlottesville Supervisor Billy Williams questioned the advisability of going ahead with expenditures on the Scottsville school when there is doubt as to whether it will continue to function after the county consolidated school goes into operation. Last year, Mr. Williams enthusiastically backed the appropriation of \$25,000 for lights for the football field at the new county high school and \$8000 to fence it in.

Ivy Supervisor Smith also questioned making definite plans for further improvements to the Scottsville school, saying that there might be a possibility of its being discontinued some time in the future.

The board decided to appoint a committee of Albemarle residents to work with the county school board committee on the school improvement program, which includes the addition of a combination cafeteria and gymnasium and a new auditorium to Scottsville High School, as well as improvements to the colored elementary school at Charlottesville and the consolidated elementary school near Free Union.

At a meeting of the school board last Thursday, plans for improving the Scottsville High School, including the primary school, were approved. Before additions are made to the high school, an architect will be obtained to draw plans. These plans will include the remodeling of the present building to provide additional classrooms in place of the old auditorium. No estimated cost is available. School board members planned first to make the improvements in the primary school, for which they would need about \$17,200.

The next step in the county school improvement program will not be known until the report is made by the committee to be set up by the supervisors.

### False Alarm Causes Big Disturbance

Citizens of Scottsville were awakened by a long, shrill blast of the town's fire siren at approximately 3:30 a.m. last Sunday morning.

Seconds after the alarm began, lights in houses all over town began to blink on and members of the Scottsville Volunteer Fire Department, living both in town and on the outskirts of town rushed to answer the call.

When they arrived at the local fire house, minutes later, they discovered that it was a false alarm. Some prankster, passing through town at this unruly hour of the night, had turned on the alarm and then left town in a car.

A number of persons were aroused in time to hear the car speed out of town and several town workmen who were still on the

street were able to give a description of the car.

This was the first false alarm to be turned in here in recent years and the townspeople are of the opinion that this was a pretty mean trick to play on the Fire Department which has served the community so well.

It is quite obvious that the person turning in this false alarm is unaware of the fact that, should his identity be revealed, town ordinances call for a \$100 to \$200 fine and/or 30 to 90 day jail sentence for turning in a false alarm.

Town Sergeant F. F. Marsh stated today, "Trooper Davidson and I are still investigating the false alarm and if we find out who the guilty one is, we intend to see that full penalty is carried out."

### Country Lawyer

 This is written before but for publication after the primary election. As we go into the last days before the primary we are treated to the usual learned opinions of our Attorney General as to what the result will be to a citizen for voting this way or that way. With all due respects to that gentleman and to the Virginia General Assembly and its statutory enactments every citizen worthy of standing upright and with head erect as a free dignified human being will vote his best judgment and will not recognize or tolerate any interference with that basic right.

It is true that the party plan of the Democrat Party and the statutory law of Virginia enacted by an almost solid Democrat General Assembly do both purport to direct the citizen as to how he or she shall vote. But such restrictions cannot stand up because they do violence to the first element of the whole concept of a free society. It is doubted if even the Supreme Court of appeals of Virginia would support such a concept but if it did then it is certain that the Supreme Court of the United States would rule it out.

Men and women who value their Freedom will refuse to accept the claim that he who votes in the Democrat primary is legally and morally bound to vote in any way other than in accord with his or her best judgment. By the very nature of things the best interest of our country, our state, and our free society demand just that.

To accept or recognize anything else is to admit that party may be placed above everything else and that is a theory repugnant to all that is right. We all know that competition is the spark plug of every line of human endeavor. We know that decadence sets in where there is lack of competition.

We know, too, that decadence attacks a political party as it does everything else. The one-party system discourages any and all independent thought. The result is that as time goes on the one-party system becomes barren of leadership that has developed as independent thinkers. Men reach the top ranks of the political ladder by blindly accepting the thinking of others. That such men are lost when they

purport to stand as leaders was clearly present in the primary campaigns just completed.

In this campaign nothing worthy of public note transpired in the campaign for governor or for any of the seats in the House of Delegates. Every one of those campaigns was conducted on the basis of "I am a fine gentleman and I would like the Job." That is all very gracious but the whole shows that one-party government does not develop leadership.

The campaign shows that men who have reached the top have done so by being good boys; by blindly accepting the thinking of some one else and by failing to stand on their own feet.

If the people, as a whole, will accept the theory that they can be directed in their voting then decadence will continue on and on. The very fact that the Democrat Party leadership does strive to direct the voting of the citizen discloses that it grabs at a straw and that it is unwilling to stand before the people of Virginia on the basis of merit alone.

There is no legal or moral obligation upon any citizen to vote in any manner other than in accord with his or her best judgment. That is a very definite obligation that goes with good citizenship. It is one thing to try to persuade voting one way or another. It is something entirely different when the persuasion takes on a tinge of intimidation.

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### Ramblings

In Blacksburg on Monday appeared 500 boys and girls from all over the state to participate in Boys' State and Girls' State, an ideal plan for making young people more conscious of their responsibilities in becoming good citizens. The boys and girls become citizens and have a part in the fictitious legislation of an imaginary state where they will hold their own elections, pass the laws, and learn ways and means of government. This citizenship training program for selected high school juniors is sponsored by the American Legion and the Legion Auxiliary, and it is filling a need that should be filled in every state in the country. Too many adults have little or no idea of how their own state and local government

functions. How in the world can we expect democracy to work as it is supposed to unless the vote of the people is a vote from educated and thinking people? It is to be hoped that the young people who learn how and why the state is governed as it is will benefit by being prepared themselves to think before they vote and act wisely when and if decisions regarding legislation are demanded of them. And, too, it is to be hoped that they can bring back a clear enough story of what they have learned so that those around them may learn from them what "good citizenship" really means.

It has been reported that large numbers of geese have been imported to certain farming areas to keep down the weeds, especially in cotton fields. The geese eat the weeds from choice, but eventually they will sample the crop, and as soon as that happens, they are immedi-

ately exported. Looks like the theory that a goose is dumb and silly will have to be revised. We know a lot of humans that can't tell a weed from a vegetable or flower. Looks like there's an antidote for almost everything in this world if it can be found. Now the praying mantis is becoming a public hero and being bred by the thousands because this odd spindly-legged insect is a natural enemy of pestiferous crop-killing insects. Turn a barrel full loose in a field of wheat, corn tomatoes, etc., and they'll clean up whatever is threatening to chew up the crop. Easier and cheaper than spraying. Now we ought to find some nature boy who will discover a natural enemy of the bugs that chew us—namely, mosquitoes, chiggers, wasps and other menaces to a peaceful day in the woods. E. F. W.

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





There were no real issues developed between the two candidates. Interest was about as low as it could have been in a primary election. This probably contributed greatly to the fact that Virginians failed to go to the polls.

Another factor not to be taken too lightly, is that there probably were hundreds of Virginians who stayed out of the Primary in order that they would be eligible to vote in the November General Election for Republican Nominee Ted Dalton if they so wish. To concede the GOP candidate even an outside chance of winning would be a real stretch of the imagination. But it may be another step toward Virginia's developing a real two-party system which would further good government in the State.





**U. S. DEFENSE NEEDS SHOULD BE PUT FIRST**

This week our Senate Appropriations Committee should complete action on one and perhaps two of the most controversial appropriation bills—the Defense Department and the Mutual Security Administration.

The House already has passed the Defense Department bill, following the recommendation of President Eisenhower to cut Air Force funds \$5 billion below the amount proposed in the Truman budget but reducing the overall total for the bill \$1,286 million below what President Eisenhower said was the essential minimum.

The President sent a letter to House leaders assuring them that the revised budget did not involve elimination of any combat planes but this was contradicted by a speech made in the Senate on July 6 by former Secretary of the Air Force Symington who said there would be a cut of 200 in the number of our latest and best bomber, the B-47.

The Mutual Security authorization bill passed by the House would allow approximately \$5 billion to be appropriated in the 1954 fiscal year and the Senate increased this amount to \$5.3 billion. President Eisenhower had recommended \$5,470 million. The bill authorized the President to withhold one billion dollars of the funds until the nations of Western Europe carried out their promises to organize a defense community with a united military force.

I have been concerned by the fact that under the proposed Mutual Security program we would provide nearly three quarters of a billion dollars to build up the French Air Force while at the same time we would, according to the statement of Senator Symington, be making a substantial cut in the combat strength of our own Air Force. This seemed questionable procedure in view of the fact that the new Premier of France does not have a working majority in the Parliament and the Communist Party is the strongest single party in France. The political situation in Italy also raises doubts as to whether or not that nation will fulfill the promises made in

May of 1951 to join the European Defense Community. The Defense and Mutual Security appropriations both are parts of the same overall defense plan and must be considered in relation to each other. The conclusion I reached was that until the threat of Communist aggression is definitely relaxed by deeds rather than words we would hazard our own security by cutting the combat planes of our Air Force below the level which all military leaders agreed a year ago was needed for our safety.

I decided, therefore, to advocate cutting the appropriation for Mutual Security one billion dollars below the total authorized and adding that amount to the appropriation for our own Air Force, to be used for rapid construction of bombers and fighter planes.

This decision was reinforced by the knowledge that the Mutual Security Agency is starting this year with an unexpended balance of \$10

billion, of which \$1.5 billion has not been obligated.






