Mr. Lincoln describes the exhaustive test conducted in Maryland by the highway departments of 11 states and the District of Columbia. This test proved beyond argument that concentrated weight is the main cause of highway destruction. In the test, the trucks used were loaded only to legal limits. To quote Mr. Lincoln again, "The Maryland road test proved that even the legal limits in many states leave the highways wide open to serious damage. Yet, these limits are being ignored every day by thousands of trucks from coast to coast."

More and more authorities are convinced that the operators of the heavy trucks should pay a much greater share of the road damage they cause than is now the case, and many Charge will do the preaching at legislators are coming to that view. The Basic Sweet Dough-Action Quick recipe is a nice one to have and Miss Rimmer follows this recipe with two more tempting suggestions.
